Delectable Leek

The leek in our backyard have poked their way out of the still cold soil and last fall's decaying leaves and starting to develop broad, smooth light green leaves. Deep purple or burgundy tints on the lower stems are now visible.

Then, taking care not to dislodge the bulb and roots, cut the base off of the bulb leaving it with the roots in the ground. This will ensure new ramps will grow the following season.

Governor Hochul Announces Project to Overhaul Outdated DMV Technology to Bring Significant Customer Service Imrovements to New Yorkers

Multi-Year Project Will Replace 50-Year-Old Technology and Make Future Service Enhancements More Seamless

As part of an ongoing effort to deliver best in class customer service to New Yorkers, Governor Kathy Hochul announced the New York State Department of Motor Vehicles has launched a multi-year project to replace and modernize a significant portion of its aging technology systems. This initiative will provide DMV customers with more efficient, secure, and convenient services, and will enable the agency to implement future technology advancements more efficiently.

"As a former County Clerk, I know first-hand the importance of the DMV in providing critical services to New Yorkers," Governor Hochul said. "These investments are a major step forward in the DMV's strategic modernization as we look to create a quicker, easier and more convenient experience for everyone."

The DMV has entered into a contract with worldclass software company FAST Enterprises, LLC, which has successfully implemented similar systems in more than 15 other states and will help DMV modernize its technology platforms and service delivery in two major stages over approximately the next four years.

Department of Motor Vehicles Commissioner Mark J.F. Schroeder said, "Throughout this project, we will be replacing a patchwork of outdated computer systems, software and databases that account for about 70 percent of DMV's business volume. This is a strategic investment and a huge undertaking, but we know the important role our agency plays in the lives of New Yorkers, and this project will help us serve them better, faster, and will make our customer's lives easier. It will also put our agency on a better footing for future upgrades, so our services can continue to evolve as technology improves."

FAST Managing Partner Martin Rankin said, "We're excited to partner with the state DMV to

change the way New Yorkers view driver and vehicle services. Our FastCore platform prioritizes efficiency and accessibility, so that all customers can access services in a time and place that suits their needs."

The new technology will replace and consolidate a significant portion of DMV's legacy technology footprint, some of which are over 50 years old, and will make DMV more secure, stable, and agile. Computer and system outages that have caused delays and long lines in DMV offices will become a thing of the past with the introduction of modern applications and proven successful solutions. Whether calling the DMV, going online or visiting an office in person, every customer will notice more reliable, responsive and faster service.

Through this project, DMV will introduce automation that will speed up processing times and eliminate paper forms wherever possible. It will also allow the DMV to offer more online and self-service options. The creation of comprehensive customer profiles will enable DMV staff to see customers' information in one place, allowing them to provide a more personalized experience and proactively flag upcoming issues and expirations. This project will continue DMV's efforts to focus on the customer experience in order to deliver first class service for all New Yorkers.

This change is part of a broader initiative to reimagine the way DMV does business, which has included dozens of improvements such as greatly expanding online live chat and enhancements to the DMV online transaction portal. DMV also introduced online pre-screening for some of the most complicated transactions like applying for a REAL ID or Enhanced ID and exchanging an out of state license and implemented a robust appointment scheduling system to significantly reduce the amount of time customers wait to be served in an office. The average wait time for a customer is now a record low of 15 minutes.



Governor Hochul Announces \$4 Million to Enhance Services for Individuals with Complex Mental Health Care Needs Statewide

Will Enable Providers to Increase and Expand Outpatient Services; Better Engage New Yorkers Struggling with Mental Illness

Governor Kathy Hochul announced that nearly \$4 million has been awarded to 77 community-based providers to establish, enhance, or expand access to specialized treatment for New Yorkers with complex mental health care needs. Administered by the New York State Office of Mental Health, the awards are part of the Governor's \$1 billion plan to strengthen the state's mental health care system by adding capacity system-wide, expanding existing programs with a record of success, funding new evidence-based initiatives, and increasing direct engagement at every stage of service. The \$4 million will allow healthcare providers on the front lines to increase outpatient engagement, provide effective group intervention, and fast-track access to vital behavioral health programs, including for groups not historically reached by traditional systems of care.

"New Yorkers struggling with mental illness should be able to access care when needed so they can live safely and successfully within their communities," Governor Hochul said. "This funding will support providers as they enhance and deliver critical outpatient services including rehabilitative services, psychiatric assessment, and crisis intervention services."

Programs receiving funding must provide complex care management and specific mental health outpatient treatments for individuals, groups, and families. These programs collectively serve more than 350,000 individuals annually, including many with a variety of high-risk or specialized mental health needs.

Office of Mental Health Commissioner Dr. Ann Sullivan said, "This funding will provide innovative approaches to engage and involve individuals and families who have been underserved by our mental health system. These dollars support services that fast-track access to care and work to ensure quality coordinated services. By building these programs, Governor Hochul is helping to ensure everyone in our state has access to critical mental health supports when and

where they need them."

The 77 community-based providers are located throughout New York State. A list of recipients by OMH region is available here.

Providers awarded funding have experience as OMH-licensed mental health outpatient treatment rehabilitative service programs, serving individuals with significant mental health needs or experiencing a mental health crisis. Nearly all of the allocated \$1 billion is now in procurement.

Governor Hochul's proposed FY 2025 Executive Budget builds on this vision through establishing new inpatient capacity, strengthening youth mental health programs; and codifying regulations to safely discharge individuals from inpatient settings.



Taking Down Tobacco Across Sullivan County

[Liberty, NY] Sullivan County students joined schools across the United States in participating in National Drug and Alcohol Facts Week (3/18-3/24/2024) and Take Down Tobacco National Day of Action (4/1/2024). Students from Liberty, Robert J. Kaiser and Eldred Middle Schools competed in poster contests, created inhaler tubes and learned about vaping and e-cigarettes from the CATCH My Breath youth vaping prevention program led by Sullivan 180.

Take Down Tobacco Day and National Drug and Alcohol Facts Week are observed annually to educate students on the effects of addictive habits like vaping and empower them to

help make a change in their community.

This year, Sullivan County middle school students competed in classroom poster contests expressing the theme "Vaping's Not Our Thing." On her poster, one Robert J. Kaiser Middle School 6th-grade student wrote:

Governor Hochul Unveils \$50 Million ConnectALL Digital Equity Plan to Close New York's' Digital Divide

Governor Kathy Hochul unveiled the \$50 million New York State Digital Equity Plan to close New York's digital divide. The plan outlines New York's statewide strategy to increase its capacity to improve digital literacy and digital job readiness skills, facilitate access to affordable internet and devices, enhance digital privacy and safety, and make government services more accessible through the internet. The announcement follows the plan's approval from the U.S. Department of Commerce's National Telecommunications and Information Administration, making New York eligible to apply for a \$36.8 million federal Capacity Grant to implement the Plan, and builds on Governor Hochul's commitment to making affordable broadband accessible to all New Yorkers.

"With the launch of New York's Digital Equity Plan, we are bringing the state one step closer to closing the digital divide," Governor Hochul said. "Affordable, accessible broadband is essential for connecting New Yorkers to work, education, and vital government services, and I will continue to work closely with the Biden administration and New York's congressional delegation to advance our ConnectALL initiative and ensure that New Yorkers can participate in our modern economy."


The Plan establishes a vision and comprehensive framework to guide the state's digital equity strategy and will anchor all of ConnectALL's programs, including building digital skills and literacies, enhancing privacy and safety, increasing access to devices, and improving the accessibility of government services for New Yorkers. The Plan also includes regional snapshots and a searchable statewide inventory of nearly 1,000 programs and organizations working to address the barriers to broadband adoption.

ConnectALL will use the federal funds, which it expects to receive later this year, in addition to state funding to implement the plan. ConnectALL will apply for the funds by the May 28 deadline and will be able to apply for additional federal funds, sourced from the \$1.44 billion Digital Equity Capacity Grant Program, over the next two years. This program is part of President Biden's Investing in America Agenda and a key part of the Internet for All initiative to ensure that all people and communities have the skills, technology, and capacity needed to reap the full benefits of our digital economy.

ConnectALL partnered with digital equity practitioners, advocates, coalitions, and state agencies to develop the State Digital Equity Plan. These partners hosted listening sessions in all ten regions of the state and the five boroughs of New York City, conducted focus groups, and held virtual town hall meetings on key issues. Over 5,000 New Yorkers contributed to the Plan by taking the New York Internet Access Survey. The Plan also received more than 150 public comments during a month-long public comment period in fall 2023.

Governor Hochul's ConnectALL Initiative

Governor Hochul established the \$1 billion ConnectALL Initiative - New York's largest-ever investment in broadband access - to close the state's digital divide, transform digital infrastructure, and ensure that all



New Yorkers have access to reliable and affordable high-speed broadband internet service. To date, ConnectALL has overseen the successful launch and implementation of several programs to advance broadband access, including:

o The Affordable Housing Connectivity Program to bring new broadband infrastructure to homes in affordable and public housing leveraging a \$100 million federal investment from the U.S. Treasury Department's Capital Projects Fund. The program is currently accepting applications for internet service providers here.

o The ConnectALL Deployment Program to fund internet service providers to reach unserved and underserved locations, drawing on an allocation of \$664.6 million in federal funding from the Broadband Equity, Access, and Deployment Program, as described in the ConnectALL Broadband Deployment Initial Proposal and Five-Year Action Plan. ConnectALL is currently conducting the challenge process to determine which locations in the state are eligible for this program.

o The Municipal Infrastructure Program will utilize \$228 million in federal funding to connect tens of thousands of homes statewide to high-speed internet through grants to public entities, local or Tribal governments, municipal utilities, utility cooperatives, and their private sector partners. 

First-Ever Office of Diversity,
Inclusion, and Civil Rights
Office Combines Existing DEI,
Accessibility, and Civil Rights
Efforts Under New Chief
Diversity Officer

Commissioner Seggos: New Office Will Help Build Stronger, More Diverse DEC to Represent and Serve All New Yorkers

New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) Commissioner Basil Seggos today announced the agency is establishing its first-ever Office of Diversity, Inclusion, and Civil Rights. The new office will combine DEC's current diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI), accessibility, and Civil Rights efforts under the leadership of its incoming and first-ever Chief Diversity Officer, and will focus on enhancing collaboration and effectiveness of program delivery to employees and the public.

"I have made it a priority to diversify the agency's workforce to better serve all of New York's communities, especially those that are


most disadvantaged," Commissioner Seggos said. "Standing up a new Office of Diversity, Inclusion, and Civil Rights will help bring greater focus to this important work and advance DEC's mission to protect public health and the environment across the state."

DEC's Office of Diversity, Inclusion, and Civil Rights will focus on four main objectives:

- o Ensure compliance with Federal and State Civil Rights requirements;
- o Expand DEC's language access offerings both in written documents and public meetings;
- o Ensure compliance with Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) in DEC operations and implementation of Executive Order 31 to meet internal accessibility goals; and
- o Oversee strategic planning and initiatives for workplace diversity inclusion and belonging.

DEC's current DEI and accessibility programs and staff will be consolidated under the new Office and will help advise all of the agency's programs and operations. The office will report to the Deputy Commissioner for Equity and Justice. DEC will announce the appointment of a new Chief Diversity Officer at a later date.

This announcement represents an expansion of the agency's equity and justice agenda under Commissioner Seggos. The agency established a new Equity and Justice portfolio in 2022 with the appointment of DEC's first-ever Deputy Commissioner for Equity and Justice. The Deputy Commissioner will now oversee the new Office as well as the Office of Indian Nation Affairs and Office of Environmental Justice.





Governor Hochul Awards Over \$3.8 million to Support Animal Shelter Improvements

Governor Kathy Hochul today announced nearly \$3.8 million has been awarded to ten animal care organizations across the state through the New York State Companion Animal Capital Fund, which is in its sixth round. The funding will support construction, renovation, and expansion projects that will enhance animal care and health and help ensure adoptions for New York's dogs and cats. As the first state in the nation to fund capital projects for animal shelters, New York State continues to demonstrate its commitment to securing safe housing and care for sheltered dogs and cats as they await adoption.

"New York State's Companion Animal Capital Fund continues to make a real difference for our shelters and humane societies across the state," Governor Hochul said. "This funding will better equip these vital facilities with the tools they need to improve the quality of care for animals as they await a permanent, loving home."

Since the 2017 launch of the Companion Animal Capital Fund program, which is administered by the Department of Agriculture and Markets, the State has dedicated over \$33 million to the program. This round of funding awarded builds on previous initiatives to offset the costs associated with capital projects run by New York State animal shelters, such as renovating dog kennels, improving medical facilities, or building more efficient shelters to reduce overall operational costs. Projects funded this year include new living spaces for dogs and cats, improved infrastructure, and enhanced outdoor spaces.

Competitive grants were awarded to shelters based on a need assessment, detailed project description, and reasonableness of cost.

The following organizations are receiving an award in this round of the program:

- o Animal Protective Foundation of Schenectady (Scotia, Schenectady County) \$500,000 to build a new admission entrance and intake facility, create isolation wards and cat housing areas, and install an improved HVAC system.
- o Bideawee (New York City, New York County) \$200,000 for roof replacement.
- o Chenango SPCA (Norwich, Chenango County) \$500,000 to construct and install isolation and double-sided kennels, including HVAC, septic, plumbing, and electrical systems.
- o Country Acres Animal Shelter (Homer, Cortland County) \$289,565.37 to update gates and dividing panels, create two new multi-use rooms, upgrade heating and electrical systems, and create roofing for outdoor spaces.
- o Jefferson County SPCA (Watertown, Jefferson County) \$466,292.70 for construction of a new addition, installation of a new HVAC system, and upgraded temperature controls and sound control, and to expand capacity for "Trap-and-Neuter" and low-cost vaccination programs.
- o Paw of Orleans County (Albion, Orleans County) \$51,249 to replace cat kennels, upgrade dog enclosures, upgrade HVAC systems, and replace a heat pump.
- o Pets Alive (Middletown, Orange County) \$500,000 for new HVAC and installation of kennel equipment, radiant flooring, and acoustical ceiling.
- o Town of Southampton (Suffolk County) \$402,608 for kennel replacement and installation of a high-performance epoxy floor system.
- o Town of Webster (Webster, Monroe County) \$400,000 to construct dog kennels and rooms and other areas including storage, food preparation, impound housing, and isolation spaces.
- o Tri Lakes Humane Society (Saranac Lake, Franklin County) \$500,000 for plumbing upgrades, installation of sound dampening systems, replacement of ventilation and damaged floors, cat porch improvements, and kennel additions.

Governor Hochul's Fiscal Year 2025 Executive Budget includes an additional \$5 million for the continuation of this critical program.

State Senator Michelle Hinchey said, "New York State's Companion Animal Capital Fund has helped countless local animal shelters make needed facility upgrades so that animals in their care can live safely and happily while they wait to find their forever homes. I'm always proud to champion this program in the State Budget, and I thank Governor Hochul for extending another round of grant funding to our state's shelters."

Assemblymember Donna Lupardo said, "I am grateful that the Companion Animal Capital Fund is available to help shelters make much-needed improvements. These funds will allow organizations to provide the highest quality care to animals while they await adoption. I'd like to thank the Governor and my colleagues for continuing to support this important effort. I have seen first-hand how well these funds have been used and know how needed these resources are."

The Department of Agriculture and Markets' Division of Animal Industry promotes sustainable animal production agriculture and the safety of the animal origin food supply. These goals are accomplished through regulatory and cooperative educational efforts with various agencies, both public and private. The Division has staff in Albany and veterinarians located across the state. In addition to many other responsibilities, the Division regulates dog licensing, sets standards for humane care of seized dogs and the inspection of municipal shelters, administers the contract for the New York State Animal Population Control Program and the Pet Dealer Inspection Program, and provides training and assistance to local enforcement officers in animal welfare cases.

The C.A.R.E.S. Van recently completed its first district tour, having visited every one of the 82 cities and towns in NY-18 in under 10 months.

Sullivan County Head Start Reopened on Tuesday, April 9

Liberty, NY - U.S. Rep. Marc Molinaro (NY-19) today released the following statement on Sullivan County Head Start:

"The Office of Head Start (OHS) has just informed me that a temporary Sullivan Head Start provider reopened centers in Woodbourne and Monticello on Tuesday, April 9. This was the step I've been pushing for alongside our local partners in Sullivan County. It will allow us to return children to the Head Start program.

"The fact remains: Sullivan Head Start should have never closed to begin with. And it's unnerving that these disruptions to families and staff went on for so long. As the work continues to secure a permanent provider, there will be a simultaneous effort to deliver accountability for the closure."

Background:

Since Sullivan Head Start abruptly closed, Rep. Molinaro has pushed for it to swiftly reopen, released statements and held mobile office hours to distribute information, and has called for accountability.

Last month, Rep. Molinaro voted to increase federal funding for Head Start Programs by over \$1 billion in the Fiscal Year 2024 appropriations. This will keep Head Start programs like the one in Sullivan County funded.

Following Molinaro's Effort, Social Security Administration Responds to Overpayment Issue Burdening Seniors Molinaro Still Fighting For Elimination Of Overpayment Collections

Washington, DC - Following efforts by U.S. Rep. Marc Molinaro (NY-19), the Social Security Administration (SSA) has adjusted their overpayment policy, which has burdened seniors and other Social Security recipients.

The SSA has made billions of dollars in overpayments to seniors and other Social Security recipients. When the SSA discovered an overpayment, they would send notices to recipients demanding the money back. In September and January, Rep. Molinaro called out the SSA, urging them to stop this practice, after hearing from seniors and other Social Security recipients in New York's 19th Congressional District who had received these notices.

As a result of Rep. Molinaro's advocacy, the agency has announced they will now only collect ten percent or \$10, whichever is greater, of a recipient's monthly benefit to recover an overpayment. This is down from 100 percent and can save seniors and other Social Security recipients thousands of dollars annually. Because this is not a complete elimination of the overpayment collection policy, Rep. Molinaro will be keeping the pressure on the SSA to fully repeal their policy.

Rep. Molinaro said, "After fighting with the Social Security Administration for many months over their absurd policy, they have taken a step in the right direction by capping the collections, but there's more to do. I'm still pushing for overpayment collections to be eliminated. Seniors should not go into debt because the Social Security Administration made a mistake."

Rep. Molinaro Calls on Gov. Hochul to Declare Opioid State of Emergency as New Report Finds NY-19 Epicenter of Crisis

Binghamton, NY - U.S. Rep. Marc Molinaro (NY-19) today called on Governor Kathy Hochul to declare a State of Emergency, allowing more funds and resources to be prioritized for addressing the opioid epidemic. Similar orders have already been issued in states like Massachusetts, Pennsylvania, and Florida.

Rep. Molinaro's call comes as a new report finds that New York's 19th Congressional District has become the epicenter of the opioid epidemic. According to the New York State Department of Health, in 2023 Broome, Sullivan, and Greene counties had among the highest opioid overdose rates in New York State.
